
Art at Concordia University, Montreal and divide my time between Delhi and Montreal.

During one of his early morning visits, Hawa Singh discovers the body of a young female floating in the Ganges near the Ghats. The female turns out to be Eva Marie Cassidy, a US citizen, working as a researcher with the Vatican Observatory, one of the oldest astronomical research institutions in the world. The autopsy reports confirm that Eva was alive when her heart was



wrenched out that resulted in her death. As the local police starts to investigate, Hawa Singh too gets embroiled in the investigation. With constant bickering with his ailing father and a bullet lodged near his brain, a result from one of the shoot-outs, Hawa Singh fights through the dense fog and chill to track the killer.

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FORTHCOMING 2015: THE SWASTIKA KILLER

The Soccer World Cup 2006, Germany. The chopped-off head of Gotthard Lerch, owner of a billion dollar porn-empire is found inside a bag at a bar. The German security gets all active and Michael Andler, a detective with Berlin Police gets on the case. He finds the man's torso inside his office with a large swastika painted in blood on the wall. The Germans manage well to hide the murder, but Michael Andler shares the details of the murder with the many international intelligence officials present there to provide assistance to the Germans. Seeing the swastika everyone points at the neo-Nazi groups. Only one man Maruththur Gopalmenon Ramachandran Balaswamy, a 52-year-old IB Officer from India known as Bala, points out that it was not a Nazi swastika but a Hindu swastika. Bala along with his protégé, Maksud Ali, and Michael Andler starts to investigate the case. They discover Gotthard's medallion with a Nazi swastika at the navagrahas in a small Hindu temple in an Asian neighborhood of Berlin. It becomes more confusing as they also find a Hindu swastika where a German is murdered and a Nazi swastika inside a Hindu temple. It soon turns into a race against time, moving from the soccer finale and a terror threat to blow up the statdium, to Amsterdam and then Mumbai's train blasts and 26/11, the inhospitable Afghanistan and finally Pakistan: Each country marked by the indelible Swastika in blood.

A Two-Part Tibetan-Buddhism based fantasy THRILLER


The Path of the Swan is essentially a Tibetan Buddhism based fantasy THRILLER. The book is spun around legends central to Tibetan Buddhism and it uses theses legends as well as the vast pantheon of deities and other-worldy beings that populate Tibetan and Mahayana Buddhism to set together a fantasy series. The central legend used is that of Shambala or what is better known as Shangrila, a legendry Buddhist paradise which is present on Earth and yet eludes ordinary reality as we understand it. Woven along with this legend is that of the prophesized birth of the Maitreya or the future Buddha that forms an important element in this series. The book moves from the eastern Himalayan state of Sikkim to Tibet and then onto Shambala.

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Part I- PATH OF THE SWAN

Book 1:

The first book, the Path of the Swan, begins in Sikkim and with two important characters Lama Ozer and young Tashi Thendup, Lama Ozer is an old experienced Lama and young Tashi is his rather refreshing student. They reside in a Hidden monastery tucked away in the alpine heights of Sikkim, the book opens with Lama Ozer going into a sacred trance and getting a call from the legendry kingdom of Shambala. Thus begins their journey to Shambala, the first quarter of the book is devoted to



this impossible journey and after many hardships and facing many trials Lama Ozer and Tashi travel across Sikkim and Tibet to the legendry Silver Fortress located in obscure western Tibet in a protected valley, Qiang La. In the fortress is located a gate to Shambala, they make it across to Shambala after leaving their bodies behind in the fortress, it is essentially their spirit body that travels into Shambala. There is a host of dakinis or sacred sky dancers waiting to pilot the two Lamas to Shambala. The dakini host is led by the golden dakini, Yeshe Nam Lha, she is a central character in the book and is introduced at this stage. Yeshe pilots the Lamas to Shambala

and enroute they meet up with the fiery celestial prince, A-Kar O, he is another important character not only is he the divine heir to the celestial Lha ermpire but he is a rare Ningma warrior and a highly accomplished celestial. In Shambala, the two Lama's are lodged in a guest house in the middle of an exquisite garden and the next morning they are taken through a mystic journey to the heart of Shambala, the royal palace of the Rigden king. Next follow descriptions of the palace of the Rigden king, the Rigden king is again a mythic being associated with Vajrayanism and Shambala. At the heart of the palace a divine meet unfolds where Arhats, Yidams, bodhisat-tvas and Buddha Lords and Godesses of the five sacred families representing different parts of the universe attend. The five central characters of the book are now assigned their divine mission beginning with Yeshe Nam Lha, the dakini who is now revealed as the prophesized mother of the divine child, the Messiah who is to be born. Then follows Lama Ozer and young Tashi, then the dark celestial Prince A-Kar O, heir to the Lha empire and last but not least Prince Narasimha, the heir to Shambala and the Rigdens legacy. The five central characters are assigned their mission of returning to Earth for the imminent birth of the divine child.

At the same time they are apprised of the grave threat they will face from the demon Lords, the Asur who are expanding their influence on Earth and will try their utmost to sabotage the divine mission. The two Princes are Yeshe's protectors though Narasimha is an excellent healer, Tashi is to serve as Yeshe's protector and friend, Lama Ozer is to serve as the go-between or the liaison between Shambala and Earth. The five have to safeguard Yeshe from the Asur till the divine child or Maitreya is born on Earth and then they have to do their utmost as protectors and guardians of this divine child. Then the Rigden plans a huge farewell banquet for the group of five, simultaneously, the Asur demon Prince, Arden Ti Nazer Bashere, is introduced in the tenth chapter. He sets out on a mission to sabotage the divine plan and kidnap Yeshe and take Shambala by surprise. He successfully infiltrates Shambala and at the banquet he lures Yeshe away and kidnaps her escaping with her onto the paths of chaos. Meanwhile, Tashi alerts Prince A-Kar O who in turn reports to the Rigden and the two Princes plus Tashi along with 80 Lha troops set out on the paths of chaos on a rescue mission. Cutting a long story short Tashi and the two Princes along with a rescue team travel to the demon world of Inka and after facing many trials and battles against the Asur they rescue the dakini Yeshe Nam Lha. The Princes face many trials on the snow bound paths of chaos they face harpies and demon wolves and traps, they fight pitched battles till they rescue Yeshe. Meanwhile Yeshe is having a strange relationship with Arden, the Prince places her under his thrall and tries to seduce her. She is attracted to him but thanks to a magical shield she is able to keep him away. The rescue team finally returns back to Shambala.

The Rigden king orders the group of five to Aggartha where they have a meeting with the Sages. The Sages apprise them of their mission in great detail and then they send all five of them to Earth and they step on Earth in the fortress of Qiang La where Tashi and Lama Ozer gain their bodies back. The celestials with them get over their shock of reaching mortal world, they have lost their divine incarnations and are mortal now. Book I ends here.

The second book is currently being worked on, it centers around the action building upto the birth of the divine child, Maitreya, the Buddha to be. The book begins at Qiang La, the silver fortress located in an obscure valley in western Tibet, the group of five tiredly travel across Tibet and make their way to Sikkim. They stay a week their and have meetings with evolved beings who hint at the location of Mt Meru. 





It is a moving story of two minor teenage girls and their struggle against a society that sees them merely as objects of sexual gratification. Set in Rajasthan, it vividly depicts the life of a family that upholds feudal traditions that transgress against human dignity, as it brings to life a small town, where modernity remains a façade and has little bearing on day to day life.

In the midst of forging new paths Mariam learns of the disappearance of her younger brother, Abdullah, in America. A reverse journeying begins as she moves backwards to her roots to confront what she has left behind in order to find the answers she is looking for. Against the backdrop of unyielding social institutions threatened by change and independent individuals, Mariam vows that she would not stop looking for her brother.

"Ashes, Wine and Dust" describes the journey Mariam undertakes which becomes an exploration of human themes of self-identity, invisible ropes of social customs, stereotypes and love. As love in all forms is tested in the most strenuous ways possible, the case of disappearance becomes the less chosen road towards a self-discovery.








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AQUILA ISMAIL

OF MARTYRS AND MARIGOLDS

"Of Martyrs and Marigolds is an elegantly written, powerful story of a young Pakistani woman, caught in the throes of revenge in the after birth of Bangladesh. Suri is born in the eastern part of Pakistan to parents who chose to migrate to it from India in 1947, when the British Empire dissolved its colony in the Indian subcontinent. She leads an idyllic life informed deeply by the Bengali culture, British colonial past and the social character of a country created for Muslims. However, in the rapidly unfolding violence that accompanies the liberation struggle of the Bengalis, Suri is considered



to be a 'Bihari', a migrant from India, who speaks Urdu and therefore has no place in Bangladesh.

At its center is the defiant love between Suri and Rumi, which blossoms in Dacca University. The campus is the focal point of the resistance to the atrocities committed by the Pakistan Army as it was of the 1952 Bengali Language Movement. When Suri becomes a victim of a division based on the mother tongue, the intensity of their love tries to transcend the political facts of Bangladesh. Placed in an internment camp, she has to choose between her family and her love for a man who belongs to the side that massacres and dispossesses her people.

Ismail writes affectionately of life in East Pakistan. Her evocation of the brutal manner in which the Pakistan army put down the demands of Bengalis for autonomy, the horror inflicted by the Bengalis on the Biharis, and India's war with Pakistan culminating in the creation of Bangladesh, is devastatingly real. Part historical drama and part romance, *Of Martyrs and Marigolds* is testament to fiction's unique power in documenting the complexities of human conflicts."

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Amrita Pritam, recipient of the Janpath Award- India's most prestigious literary prize, for her Kagaz Te Canvas (Punjabi), Sahitya Academy Award, Padma Shri and many other such honours, wrote for the common people in Punjabi and was known for her simplicity and purity of thought. Where she wrote the acclaimed and laurels-winning *Pinjar* or the *Raseedi Tikat*, she also wrote the thrilling *Doctor Dev, Kore* Kaagaz (blank pages) and Unchaas Din (49 days). Essentially a poet, she has several novels and collections of short stories to her credit and in total penned 28 novels, 18 anthologies of prose, 5 short stories and 16 miscellaneous prose volumes. Much of her writing has been translated into English, Hindi and some European languages.



Aquila Ismail has worked as an Associate Professor of Electrical Engineering in NED University of Engineering and Technology, Karachi. She has written extensively on literature, women and development issues for newspapers and magazines. She has translated a number of Urdu works of fiction including Harvest of Anger and other Stories, Godavari, and Zindabahar Lane. Her non-fiction works include documentation of the work of Orange Pilot Project (OPP) a development NGO of Karachi.




THE BOATMAN'S HOME AND OTHER **STORIES**





AVALOK LANGER

IN PURSUIT OF CONFLICT

Born into a military family, the author's idea of India was what he saw on the map. As a kid, he stood at attention, saluting the TV screen every Republic Day as the national anthem played. He always understood why the Army fought, why they were willing to die and believed in the idea of India. His journey through the Northeast has not only been about discovering the people, their culture and violent uprisings, but a journey where he has questioned the many truths he grew up on.

When asked by a militant Naga general about where he was from, the only answer the author could up with in his strange attempt to be honest yet cover up his military background, was his prep-Partition roots - how he was part Kashmiri, an idea that he liked - another struggling people, and how his other three grandparents were from what is now Pakistan – Lahore, Abbottabad and Dera Ismail Khan. The man's answer: "That's why we fight. You are man without a home, your ancestors didn't fight for their homes and today you are a man without his land. We Nagas don't want that, we don't want to lose our land. So we fight."

As Avalok Langer travelled from state to state on a shoe string budget, he started to push and take up issues local journalist were scared to, travelling to Nepal and Myanmar to complete the stories that ended at the borders and started to see through the mesmerising web of patriotism and nationalism to core of most movements, money. It was a business, a business that earned Naga groups over Rs 600 crore annually from just the central funds they were able to siphon off.

The author chose to report on the Northeast by pure accident, a financial blunder. However, this largely ignored part of the country has captivated his imagination for the last five years. It is a complex maze of emotions, culture, history, aspirations and spy games that exists outside the mental space of the average India. Through his stories, he wants to share with the nation this forgotten frontier – In Pursuit of Conflict.

MUGHALS AT WAR

A History of the Military Campaigns of the Great Mughals 1526-1710 OR A History of the Military Campaigns that made the Mughal Empire 1526-1710

Mughals at War' is the study of conflicts in the reigns of the first six Mughal emperors, which spanned the better part of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries and examines their individual dispositions before, during and after each of these campaigns. Every battle, siege and campaign described in these pages is unique; for the reasons why it was fought, the way in which it was fought and for the implications of the result of that particular military event. Each of these confrontations was critical to the dynamic of how the Mughal Empire and the consequent history of India developed. The Mughals waged war for enrichment, aggrandizement and power and their wars introduced new political processes, cultural nuances and social change, sometimes unintentionally, to the lands and people they brought under their control. New territories and the expansion of the empire necessitated the modification of methods and systems within their militarism.

The book brings focus on the martial aspects of the Mughal Empire and its luminaries, through a study of particular campaigns and demonstrates how that engagement changed the course of history. This is by no means a conclusive thesis on the battles, sieges and campaigns covered here. However, it is the first attempt that combines a diverse range of sources. Topographical information, outlooks of the victors as well as the vanquished, the psychologies of commanders, soldiery and campfollowers, the 'live coverage' of neutral observers and other first hand contemporary evidence is brought together to present a comprehensive perspective of specific contests between the Mughals themselves and their adversaries.

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Yusuf Anis Ahmad Ansari, great grandson of Dr. MA Ansari (President of the Indian National Congress), was educated at the Stowe School in England and graduated in Industrial Relations from the London School of Economics. He returned home to the complex world of Indian politics and served as a Member, Department of Policy Planning and Coordination, AICC, and Chairman, Department of Policy Planning and Coordination, UPCC. He contributes regularly to magazines and newspapers on political issues and current affairs in a changing India. He is the author of Sonia Gandhi, Triumph of Will (Tara Press).

AKBAR: THE FIRST INDIAN

A biography of the Mughal Emperor Akbar 1556-1605.

Akbar's reign burst upon the stagnant landscape of medieval Indian life with a vitality that altered its predictable, repetitive motions forever, and gave a new energy and perspective to history of the sub-continent ever since. Descended from some of the greatest conquerors of history but who was himself born the son of a fugitive, an individual who, by his vision and the sheer force of his personality created one of the greatest empires the world has ever seen.

The Jesus Jigsaw tells the story of one man's journey throughout all of India upon a quest for the historical Jesus. Building upon the work of Nicholas Notovich (*The Life of Issa*) and Fida Hassnain (*the Search for the Historical Jesus / The Fifth Gospel / Jesus in Kashmir*), the book paints perhaps the most detailed account of Jesus' time in India both before and after the Crucifixion.

The Jesus Jigsaw is part mystery puzzle, part history and part foray into the field of comparative theology. Beginning at the end of the nineteenth century, with the publication of Nicholas Notovich's *'Life of Issa,'* the idea that Jesus lived and even died in India has slowly taken root among interested parties the world over.

Its author, Damian Bullen, describes his journey around India, from Ladakh in the Himalayas to the Western Ghats of Tamil Nadu, collecting all the clues which Jesus left behind during his time on the subcontinent. The resulting picture shows how Jesus is worshipped by Hindus, Muslims and Christians alike, and is known by several different names or avatars such as Asvaghosha, Iarchus and Agastya, etc.

In the book, these various names of Jesus are referred to as 'avatars'. The aim of the Jesus Jigsaw is to identify each of these Indian 'avatars,' connecting them to each other and also to the traditional character of Jesus as presented by the Christian Gospels. The complete manuscript runs to approximately 82,280 words, accompanied by the personal photographs of each place visited by the author. To this are added over thirty notes, an extensive academic bibliography and five key texts either written by, or about, the Indian Jesus.

KASHMIR (tentative title)

With an endorsement by Adrian Levy

India's collective sense of history is among the major reasons that prevent large number of Indians from having a sympathetic view of Kashmir. Unlike the rest of India, no invading Muslim army ever conquered Kashmir. Islam flourished in the Valley thanks to the conversion of a Buddhist king to Islam and his patronage to Sufism in the 14th century. Indigenous kings ruled Kashmir for the next two centuries before Akbar brought it under the Mughal Empire. Kashmiris initially frustrated the Mughal attempt to occupy the Valley by organizing an armed revolt against its army. It was perhaps the first time Kashmiris had actually taken up arms before 1989. Kashmiris were unsuccessful the second time when Yousaf Chak capitulated to usher in non-Kashmiri rule till 1947. The Sikhs and Dogras brutalized Kashmiris in the intervening period, subjecting them to untold miseries. Even perceived cruelty to cows was subjected to severe punishment and freedom of religion was virtually non-existent. Mosques were closed and butchers hung publicly. Here again Kashmir's history has taken a different course and this forms an important aspect of my book.

Sheikh Abdullah emerged as a messiah and redeemer of Kashmiris and his friendship with Jawaharlal Nehru played a key role in deciding Kashmir's political fate when the subcontinent was divided in 1947. His volunteers guarded Hindu homes while Hindus and Muslim were slaughtering each other elsewhere in India. Unlike other Muslim-majority areas, Kashmir again took a different course and acceded to India in October 1947 with certain guarantees. New Delhi was not keen on keeping its promises became clear sooner when Abdullah was jailed on flimsy charges despite playing a key role in Kashmir's accession to India. The process of undermining Kashmir's autonomy began soon after and laid the foundations of Kashmir's acrimonious relationship with New Delhi. The man responsible for Kashmir's accession with India was to spend two decades behind bars. In this historical backdrop, I argue in the book that New Delhi began messing up in Kashmir from day one because of its suspicions about Kashmir's predominantly Muslim population. It thus formulated policies designed at keeping Kashmir to manipulate elections and as a result of this a succession of puppets ruled the state after Abdullah. Kashmir's majority Muslim population began feeling increasingly uncomfortable because of this and overbearing nature of the state. In the 1960s and 1970s, you could get jailed in Kashmir for something as innocuous as listening to radio Pakistan. Arbitrary arrests and torture were common even before 1989 when the state had the excuse of cross-border terrorism. This along with farcical democracy degenerated into perhaps the second armed uprising in the history of Kashmir in 1989.

The Indian state's crackdown on the Kashmiri insurgency was furious. Unarmed protesters were fired upon indiscriminately leading to several massacres in the early 1990s. This coincided with arbitrary arrests and even sexual violence which forced the main Kashmiri militant organisation to give up the armed struggle in the 1994. This could have been a turning point for New Delhi to do some course correction. But instead it chose the disastrous policy of using death squads and illegal militias to brutalise Kashmiris to the extent that by late 1990s foreign mercenaries began orchestrating suicide attacks in the Valley. Kashmir witnessed its most violent phase between 1999 and 2004 before India and Pakistan began a peace process. Consequently Kashmir has since seen almost negligible militant violence.

In between, all appeals of ending Kashmir's militarisation and draconian laws have fallen on deaf ears. The Armed Forces Special Powers Act for instance violates the basic right to life and has perpetuated killings of innocent people. This has been among the reasons why Kashmir has witnessed some of the biggest street protests since 2008. Even these protests have had no impact on the government. In fact, 300 unarmed protesters have been killed since then, which is much higher than those killed in militant violence.

In 2010 alone, over 120 people were killed. This included kids as young as nine and women. It has had virtually had no impact on Indian public opinion which remains hostile to any healing touch policy there. This has a lot to do with how the media has reported Kashmir particularly in the last three decades. While the international press has been reporting harrowing stories of rights abuses in Kashmir, the Indian media has largely taken a nationalistic line on Kashmir. This has worsened in last 10 years. As such it has turned Indian public against any resolution to the Kashmir issue instead of moulding opinion to support a just and humane approach to Kashmir.

My book puts a human face to the entire Kashmir story with a historical perspective focussing on the massacres of the 1990s which governor Jagmohan justified unabashedly, torture, sexual violence, draconian laws, mass graves etc. Each chapter has been told from how I saw it personally growing up in Kashmir in the 1990s, and through the personal stories of two generations of my family.

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

SAHIB'S WAR

Indian Soldiers on the Western Front 1914-18

The book looks at the forgotten story of the contribution of Indian soldiers in World War One. One and a half million Indian soldiers volunteered for the war, the largest army from the colonies. They came from remote areas in India and were sent straight into the trenches in the harshest of winters, fighting a war that was not of their making, and which they barely understood. Yet they won several Victoria Crosses and gallantry awards. The book looks at the individual stories of the sepoys and their journey to the killing fields of Flanders.

The book is timed for the centenary of the Great War (which begins from next year) and particularly the hundredth anniversary of the Battle of Neuve Chapelle (March 2015), which the Indians fought as a single unit.

Already a published children's author, she joined SOE as a British secret agent in 1943, and returned to Paris as a radio operator liaising with local Resistance cells. After the Gestapo broke the networks, almost the entire system of clandestine contact rested on her slim shoulders. Despite daring escapes, the Germans caught her. Utterly unbowed by Nazi cruelty, she was killed in Dachau in 1944 – with "Liberté" on her lips. Posthumous holder of the George Cross and the Croix de Guerre, a Muslim princess and Indian nationalist who gave everything in the struggle for freedom.



FINDING THE DEMON'S FIDDLE

Finding the Demon's Fiddle is completely based on fact and fits most closely into the genre of narrative nonfiction/travel literature. But more than anything, it is a story...or rather several stories wound around a central narrative, which move together in the same direction and all of which eventually draw to their respective conclusions. It is an account of a period recently spent in India and Sri Lanka researching the oldest extant ancestor of the violin family, the ravanhattha. A personal and travel narrative is used as a vehicle to delve into the history, religion, scripture, and mythology surrounding this fascinating instrument. The



Ravanhattha, according to Hindu scripture, was invented by Ravana- a demon on a par with the Christian devil. It has been preserved from extinction by a nomadic sect of priests (Bhopas) in Rajasthan who use it during their 36-hour recitation of The Epic of Pabuji.

Besides the instrument, the book narrative also traces the Ravana mythology in India and Sri Lanka. There is a perhaps slightly controversial reassessment of Ravana which is at odds with the orthodox Hindu image of the evil demon portrayed in the Ramayana. The book is written in a deliberately easy-going, open style and can be read and enjoyed on a fairly superficial level as the story of a somewhat obsessive European meeting interesting people and experiencing unusual and often humorous situations. However, we won't pretend that the book is simple. Often the tip of the iceberg is visible, but there is a great deal happening under the surface.

The target readership is essentially in South Asia, Europe and the USA. His work has already picked up a fair amount of interest in India and Sri Lanka, and we feel that it has considerable potential in all countries, though certain aspects of it may well prove a little controversial here.

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Patrick Jered, a native English speaker was born in the UK, but has lived most of his life in The Netherlands. He is a professional medical writer with a PhD in molecular genetics. Patrick, until recently was employed by the academic publisher Elsevier. He is now working with an international medical communications agency, Excerpta Medica, part of the Omnicom group. In his spare time he writes about music and unusual musical instruments for specialist magazines. Besides his primary source of income, he is also a semi-professional musician, having released two CDs. His last collection Tykhana released in 2007 was well received by critics in Europe and the USA. It still sells the occasional copy on Amazon, iTunes, and a number of other online retailers. Finding the Demon's Fiddle is his first full-length book. It will certainly not be his last. He has some great ideas for future projects.



Bangalore based *Vikram Sampath* is the author of three acclaimed narrative non-fiction books. He is one of the few Indian writers who excels at biographies, bringing to life the stories of royals, singers & maestro musicians.

He is the writer of a much-appreciated essay on legendary singer K L Saigal in Penguin's anthology titled 'Bollywood Top 20' (2012). He has been a Fellow at the Institute for Advanced Study (Wissenschaftskolleg) in Berlin, Germany (for 2010-11) where he studied the early gramophone recordings of Indian music. He is a visiting speaker at the University of Queensland, Brisbane, which has also offered him an opportunity to pursue a PhD in Indian music history. The Society Magazine listed Vikram among **50 Top Young Achievers of the country** in its annual edition in 2012. He was also a Brand Ambassador of Titan's "Be More" **Campaign in 2009** and nominated as one of **Bangalore's Heroes**' by the Times Group.

Vikram has established an 'Archive of Indian Music' (AIM) -the country's first Digital Sound Archive that digitizes and preserves old gramophone recordings of India and makes them readily available to people through an online portal. Vikram is also one of the Founder Directors of the **Bangalore Literature Festival (BLF).** Vikram has been appointed to several prominent Committees- those of the Central Government's **I&B Ministry** and **Prasar Bharati** on establishing AIR & DD Archives, Dr Sam Pitroda Commission, Prasar Bharati Marketing Group and the Karnataka Government's Vision Group for Tourism Development & formulation of new Tourism Policy.

Vikram publishes regularly in leading Indian dailies and magazines on a wide array of topics. In addition, he is also a serious student of Carnatic Classical Vocal music and has been training under various eminent practitioners of the art form like Vidwan D.V. Nagaraj, Dr. Bombay Jayashri Ramnath and Dr. Jayanthi Kumaresh. Subjects related to history, music, art and culture are close to his heart.

VIKRAM SAMPATH

*POISON IN HER BREAST: the banished girls of nautch

'Hell is in her eyes; in her breast is a vast ocean of poison. Round her comely waist dwells the furies of hell, her hands are brandishing unseen daggers ever ready to strike unwary or willful victims. Her blandishments are India's ruin. Alas! Her smile is India's death' (Keshab Chandra Sen, Social reformer, Bengal).

This was the popular narrative that dominated the social reform movement in the early decades of 20th Century India—a narrative that sought to demonize all performing women as immoral entities and prostitutes. This culminated in the 'Anti-Nautch' campaign that banished these women forever from the world of art and threw them, literally, into the bins of history. Performing arts were 'resurrected', sanitized and made safe for the middle classes. Bharatanatyam and Kathak sprung from the ashes of the Devadasis' Sadir and the Tawaif's Nautch, while Hindustani and Carnatic music were cleansed of their 'erotic' and immoral content. In this shrill narrative, an important milestone in the history of Indian classical music has gone unnoticed and obliterated from national consciousness. When recording technology came calling in 1902, it was women largely belonging to this courtesan community that embraced it readily. The catalogues of the Gramophone Company, which came to India to record 'native' voices, clearly indicate close to 400-500 women from across the country who undoubtedly became the pioneers in recording. Their male counterparts shied away citing superstitious beliefs. Some were wary of sharing the secrets of their art by selling it cheap. The manner in which these women negotiated their engagement with the foreign companies and got their act together showed their shrewd business skills in addition to their proficiency in the medium of music to be able to compress it all in a 3 minute gramophone disc.

This book seeks to bring these women back into public reckoning by piecing together fragments of their lives and situating it in a socio-cultural context of 20th Century India. Beginning with tracing the tradition of the courtesan in India right from the ancient period to the time they made their first brush with technology, it would take the reader through the kaleidoscopic world of the Tawaif/Devadasi. The lives of about 20 women would be dealt with in detail, set against the places of their origin and the aristocratic/ urban/ royal patronage that existed there. Gauhar Jaan of Calcutta, Janki Bai of Allahabad, Malka Jaan of Agra, Mumtaz Jaan of Delhi, Vidhyadhari Bai of Banaras, Husna Jaan of Banaras, Binodini Dasi of Calcutta, Giribala Dasi of Calcutta, Bedana Dasi of Calcutta, Krishnabhamini of Calcutta, Zohra Bai of Agra, Mohamdi Jaan of Lucknow, Bai Sundara Bai of Pune, Mehboob Jaan of Solapur, Bangalore Nagaratnamma, Salem Godavari, Coimbatore Thayi, Dhanakoti of Kanchipuram, Tiruchendur Shanmukhavadiyoo and Oomda Jaan of Hyderabad are the women who would be profiled. The royal courts of Delhi, Lucknow, Rampur, Hyderabad, Baroda and Mysore, the urban centres of Madras, Calcutta and Bombay and the Freedom struggle would form the foil to their stories. The book would end with the Anti-nautch movement, the fall from grace of these women, the transition that many of them made in society and in their personal lives (case studies being those of M S Subbulakshmi, Siddheshwari Devi, Begum Akhtar etc.) and the disappearance of the memories of those that did not adapt to changing times. It would also bring to light some of the exquisite poetry of the courtesan and come along with a CD of some of their select tracks.

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MY NAME IS GAUHAR JAAN! -

the life and times of a musician

His book 'My name is Gauhar Jaan!- the life and times of a musician' (Rupa& Co) is the biography of Gauhar Jaan, India's first classical musician to record on the gramophone. The book has won great appreciation across India and abroad by eminent personalities including Vice President of India Mr. Hamid Ansari, Smt. Sonia Gandhi, Mr. Shyam Benegal, Pt. A Human History of Financial Speculation

What's so bad about a recession? The germs of *Money Mania* began with that chance comment in late 2007.

The fallout from the collapse of two Bear Stearns hedge funds earlier in August had gathered pace and we all clustered around Bloomberg screens daily, waiting to see if someone had called time on happy hour. On the 1st of December 2007, the US officially went into recession. It was not a surprise in hindsight, given the events of the previous few months, though few of us at the time had any inkling of how much more painful life was about to become. As defaults soared and the euphoria of the last few years evaporated, the finger pointing began. It was the fault of bankers for lending irresponsibly. It was the fault of central bankers for keeping interest rates so low.



It was the fault of the politicians for turning a blind eye to the weapons of financial mass destruction massing outside suburbia and Capitol Hill. Everybody else was to blame and everyone wanted just to return to happier days when bust was a phrase confined to late-night television and poker games, growth and ever-rising financial markets were a given and money was something we could all make or access. In short, they wanted to get back to normal.

Are crises an inevitable consequence of economic growth? Are they always bad? Do we need a lender of last resort? Are paper money systems an expensive and ultimately doomed experiment? When does a crisis of finance become one of society? These and many other implications are explored in the book's chapters.

In the end, we conclude that rises and falls are as natural to the economic condition as breathing is to the human condition. It's when we try and stifle these ebbs and flows that the system revolts. Therein lies the lesson: a clear perception of the characteristics common to these episodes can only help in warning off and curbing our irrational enthusiasm so that we remove the risks of our speculations becoming systemic. Try too hard to argue your innate brilliance and the outcome is inevitably the same, as amply demonstrated throughout recorded history.



The chapters, interspersed with the weaves of phulkari, poetry of Bulleh Shah, legends of Heer and Sohni and verses from folk songs hold within them traditional yet simple-to-make recipes for classic Punjabi dishes. From phirni set in a mitti ka kulhad to a barbecue party under the winter sky, this book is a love story. It's a love story of a Punjabi and her food, when the food went beyond filling her stomach to her senses as well.

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
