

It's that time of the year again! The annual ICT T-20 carnival has come to town. On the agenda this year is more than just cricket as Shaurya Chauhan, the skipper of Capital Cavaliers soon discovers.

Shaurya is going through a rough patch. His batting isn't clicking and his captaincy is being questioned, what with the team close to being knocked out. Plus, Manu Dayal, the team's dare-devil batsman, is breathing down Shaurya's neck, waiting in the wings to take over the captaincy. As Shaurya contends with these challenges on the professional front, and the end of a love affair on the personal, he becomes embroiled in something deeper and even more sinister. 



*THE BUTCHER OF BENARES by Mahendra Jakhar



In the chilling winter month of January, Hawa Singh, a Senior Inspector from Delhi Crime branch comes to Benares accompanying his 89-year-old terminally ill father, Fauja Singh, whose last wish is to die in the holy city. They take a room in Mukti Bhavan, the Salvation House, one of the many death houses in Benares. During one of his early morning visits, Hawa Singh discovers the body of a young female floating in the Ganges near the Ghats.

The female turns out to be Eva Marie Cassidy, a US citizen, working as a researcher with the Vatican Observatory, one of the oldest astronomical research institutions in the world. The autopsy reports confirm that Eva was alive when her heart was wrenched out that resulted in her death. As the local police starts to investigate, Hawa Singh too gets embroiled in the investigation. With constant bickering with his ailing father and a bullet lodged near his brain, a result from one of the shoot-outs, Hawa Singh fights through the dense fog and chill to track the killer.

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THE SWASTIKA KILLER by Mahendra Jakhar

The Soccer World Cup 2006, Germany. The chopped-off head of Gotthard Lerch, owner of a billion dollar porn-empire is found inside a bag at a bar. The German security gets all active and Michael Andler, a detective with Berlin Police gets on the case. He finds the man's torso inside his office with a large swastika painted in blood on the wall.

The Germans manage well to hide the murder, but Michael Andler shares the details of the murder with the many international intelligence officials present there to provide assistance to the Germans. Seeing the swastika everyone points at the neo-Nazi groups. Only one man Maruththur Gopalmenon Ramachandran Balaswamy, a 52-year-old IB Officer from India known as Bala, points out that it was not a Nazi swastika but a Hindu swastika. Bala along with his protégé, Maksud Ali, and Michael Andler starts to investigate the case. They discover Gotthard's medallion with a Nazi swastika at the navagrahas in a small Hindu temple in an Asian neighborhood of Berlin. It becomes more confusing as they also find a Hindu swastika where a German is murdered and a Nazi swastika inside a Hindu temple. It soon turns into a race against time, moving from the soccer finale and a terror threat to blow up the statdium, to Amsterdam and then Mumbai's train blasts and 26/11, the inhospitable Afghanistan and finally Pakistan: Each country marked by the indelible Swastika in blood.



Ella Laraway, an HR executive with Trans-Geo Tech, leads a massive outsourcing of jobs in Toronto. Ella's US mentor, Odette Dodeur, is later found dead, her body shipped from Toronto to China in a barrel along with the message, "Outsource this". TGT's CEO Tapan Rao accuses Ella of incompetence in handling the security around the outsourcings, and makes her the scapegoat in Odette's death.

Adding to Ella's professional difficulties, he assigns her as TGT's liaison with the detective investigating the murder. But worst of all, Ella is the murderer's next target. Krishna's marital home is very different from the house she grew up in. She soon learns that her father-in-law, a drunkard and a lecher, who is not above carrying on with a maidservant, is deeply in debt and expects her father to help him out. Krishna's fifteen-year-old widowed cousin, Gudiya, accompanies her to Rokhagadh, but is ill-treated by Krishna's in-laws, culminating in her rape by Krishna's father-in-law, on Diwali night. When Krishna's father learns of this, he wants to take both girls away immediately, but dies soon after, in a mysterious "accident" and Gudiya finds herself pregnant. The Singhs are willing to help her, provided it is a male child. If she is carrying a female child, she will have to abort. Krishna's and Gudiya's responses to the death of the former's father; their refusal to knuckle under to the Singhs; their decision to fight for their survival against impossible odds and to stand by each other forms the crux of 'Bubble Wrap'. It is a moving story of two minor teenage girls and their struggle against a society that sees them merely as objects of sexual gratification. Set in Rajasthan, it vividly depicts the life of a family that upholds feudal traditions that transgress against human dignity, as it brings to life a small town, where modernity remains a façade and has little bearing on day to day life.







OF MARTYRS AND MARIGOLDS by Aquila Ismail

"Of Martyrs and Marigolds is an elegantly written, powerful story of a young Pakistani woman, caught in the throes of revenge in the after birth of Bangladesh. Suri is born in the eastern part of Pakistan to parents who chose to migrate to it from India in 1947, when the British Empire dissolved its colony in the Indian subcontinent. She leads an idyllic life informed deeply by the Bengali culture, British colonial past and the social character of a country created for Muslims. However, in the rapidly unfolding violence that accompanies the liberation struggle of the Bengalis, Suri is considered to be a 'Bihari', a migrant from India, who speaks Urdu and therefore has no place in Bangladesh.



At its center is the defiant love between Suri and Rumi, which blossoms in Dacca University. The campus is the focal point of the resistance to the atrocities committed by the Pakistan Army as it was of the 1952 Bengali Language Movement. When Suri

becomes a victim of a division based on the mother tongue, the intensity of their love tries to transcend the political facts of Bangladesh. Placed in an internment camp, she has to choose between her family and her love for a man who belongs to the side that massacres and dispossesses her people.

Ismail writes affectionately of life in East Pakistan. Her narrative makes the cities where the story is set become real. Her evocation of the brutal manner in which the Pakistan army put down the demands of Bengalis for autonomy, the horror inflicted by the Bengalis on the Biharis, and India's war with Pakistan culminating in the creation of Bangladesh, is devastatingly real. Adapting real history into page-turning fiction, Ismail captures an important era in South Asian history with intelligence and grace. Part historical drama and part romance, Of Martyrs and Marigolds is testament to fiction's unique power in documenting the complexities of human conflicts."

The inspiring Noor Inayat Khan ought to be as popular a heroine in British schools as Florence Nightingale once was. Basu's moving and scrupulous biography might help that to happen. Descended from Tipu Sultan, that great thorn in the imperial side in India, Noor grew up in Paris in a family of musicians and Sufi mystics. Already a published children's author, she joined SOE as a British secret agent in 1943, and returned to Paris as a radio operator liaising with local Resistance cells. After the Gestapo broke the networks, almost the entire system of clandestine contact rested on her slim shoulders. Despite daring escapes, the Germans caught her. Utterly unbowed by Nazi cruelty, she was killed in Dachau in 1944 – with "Liberté" on her lips. Posthumous holder of the George Cross and the Croix de Guerre, a Muslim princess and Indian nationalist who gave everything in the struggle for freedom.

Indian Soldiers on the Western Front 1914-18

(Alternative titles: Sepoys on the Western Front – Indian soldiers in the First World War Sahib's War – Indian soldiers on the Western Front 1914-18)

The book looks at the forgotten story of the contribution of Indian soldiers in World War One. One and a half million Indian soldiers volunteered for the war, the largest army from the colonies. They came from remote areas in India and were sent straight into the trenches in the harshest of winters, fighting a war that was not of their making, and which they barely understood. Yet they won several Victoria Crosses and gallantry awards. The book looks at the individual stories of the sepoys and their journey to the killing fields of Flanders.

The book is timed for the centenary of the Great War (which begins from next year) and particularly the hundredth anniversary of the Battle of Neuve Chapelle (March 2015), which the Indians fought as a single unit.







'Hell is in her eyes; in her breast is a vast ocean of poison. Round her comely waist dwells the furies of hell, her hands are brandishing unseen daggers ever ready to strike unwary or willful victims. Her blandishments are India's ruin. Alas! Her smile is India's death' (Keshab Chandra Sen, Social reformer, Bengal).

This was the popular narrative that dominated the social reform movement in the early decades of 20th Century India—a narrative that sought to demonize all performing women as immoral entities and prostitutes. This culminated in the 'Anti-Nautch' campaign that banished these women forever from the world of art and threw them, literally, into the bins of history. Performing arts were 'resurrected', sanitized and made safe for the middle classes. Bharatanatyam and Kathak sprung from the ashes of the Devadasis' Sadir and the 'Tawaif's Nautch, while Hindustani and Carnatic music were cleansed of their 'erotic' and immoral content.

In this shrill narrative, an important milestone in the history of Indian classical music has gone unnoticed and obliterated from national consciousness. When recording technology came calling in 1902, it was women largely belonging to this courtesan community that embraced it readily. The catalogues of the Gramophone Company, which came to India to record 'native' voices, clearly indicate close to 400-500 women from across the country who undoubtedly became the pioneers in recording. Their male counterparts shied away citing superstitious beliefs. Some were wary of sharing the secrets of their art by selling it cheap. The manner in which these women negotiated their engagement with the foreign companies and got their act together showed their shrewd business skills in addition to their proficiency in the medium of music to be able to compress it all in a 3 minute gramophone disc. Indian music would not have taken a giant leap forward towards modernism and broken out of the shackles of closeted patronage to global mass media, but for the brave attempts of some of these women. Yet, sadly, their names bring in no recall today in the world of musicians—both Hindustani and Carnatic.

This book seeks to bring these women back into public reckoning by piecing together fragments of their lives and situating it in a socio-cultural context of 20th Century India. Beginning with tracing the tradition of the courtesan in India right from the ancient period to the time they made their first brush with technology, it would take the reader through the kaleidoscopic world of the Tawaif/Devadasi. The lives of about 20 women would be dealt with in detail, set against the places of their origin and the aristocratic/ urban/ royal patronage that existed there. Gauhar Jaan of Calcutta, Janki Bai of Allahabad, Malka Jaan of Agra, Mumtaz Jaan of Delhi, Vidhyadhari Bai of Banaras, Husna Jaan of Banaras, Binodini Dasi of Calcutta, Giribala Dasi of Calcutta, Bedana Dasi of Calcutta, Krishnabhamini of Calcutta, Zohra Bai of Agra, Mohamdi Jaan of Lucknow, Bai Sundara Bai of Pune, Mehboob Jaan of Solapur, Bangalore Nagaratnamma, Salem Godavari, Coimbatore Thayi, Dhanakoti of Kanchipuram, Tiruchendur Shanmukhavadivoo and Oomda Jaan of Hyderabad are the women who would be profiled. The royal courts of Delhi, Lucknow, Rampur, Hyderabad, Baroda and Mysore, the urban centres of Madras, Calcutta and Bombay and the Freedom struggle would form the foil to their stories. The book would end with the Anti-nautch movement, the fall from grace of these women, the transition that many of them made in society and in their personal lives (case studies being those of M S Subbulakshmi, Siddheshwari Devi, Begum Akhtar etc.) and the disappearance of the memories of those that did not adapt to changing times. It would also bring to light some of the exquisite poetry of the courtesan and come along with a CD of some of their select tracks.

Charles Foster needs no introductions as an established writer and an academic at the University of Oxford. He has written, edited or contributed to well over thirty books. 

The idea: To walk through India is to walk along edges. This is fascinating, vertiginous and tragic. This book is an account of the walk.

Social, political, geographical and ontological edges do similar things to the people who live on them and near them. Edges define the shapes of continents, societies and individuals. Trace the edges, and you've mapped the place or the person. But this is almost never done. Writers and politicians try to get to the centre of things – to the cores of cities, issues and personalities. Yet these centers are uniquely unrevealing. They say nothing about the relationship with the wider world of the entity that is being examined, and there is a law of centripetal greyness that makes all centres of everything similar to each other. But edges, quite apart from anything else, are a lot more interesting than actual or metaphorical Government buildings.

You need to get out to the edges to see shapes, perspective, relationships and the real colours of things' – says Charles. It is often at the edge of our vision, and in the dusk at the edge of the day, that we see the strange but most characteristically native creatures. It is at the edges, too, where we encounter the Other: sometimes that results in new syntheses, sometimes in violence, and sometimes in sclerosis. Rarely does it make us less ourselves.

In this book Charles Foster explores India's edges, hoping to see what has been missed by the hysterical concentration on the central.

'I am a foreigner' says Charles. That is an advantage. Whenever I'm in India I'm dangling scarily over the edge separating the usual and the unusual. Living like that attunes your ear to the language shared by all the edge people.

There are obvious dangers in my foreignness'... but these are dangers that, I hope, I've seen and sidestepped in my previous writing about India. I plead not guilty to literary colonialism, voyeurism and a romantic love of misery.

Yusuf Anis Ahmad Ansari was born in Allahabad, Uttar Pradesh (UP), India on 26th January 1978.



He was educated at the Welham Boys Preparatory School, Dehra Dun and the Stowe School in Buckinghamshire, England. He graduated with a BSc in Industrial Relations and Human Resource Management from The London School of Economics in 2000.

By 2001, Yusuf returned to New Delhi, India, to the newly created Department of Policy Planning and Coordination of the All India Congress Committee (AICC). For ten years he worked within the highest echelons of the Congress Party and fought an election for the Uttar Pradesh Provincial Assembly from the rural heartlands of UP in 2007. He served as Chairman of the Department of Policy Planning and Coordination of the Uttar Pradesh Congress Committee (UPCC) from 2004-2007 and at the age of

26 became one of the youngest Secretaries of the UPCC. His great-grandfather had been President of the Indian National Congress in 1927; a great-grand-uncle its President in 1933. Other members of his family had been Members of Parliament and of the UP Provincial Assembly. Following his defeat in the 2007 election, he moved to Ranthambhore, in Rajasthan and was General Manager of one of India's finest safari camps, Sher Bagh, in this land of the Tiger, until 2011. During his four years in Ranthambhore, he often played an advisory role on matters of park management and other conservation and policy issues. Yusuf returned to UP in 2011 and worked in some key constituencies in preparation for the 2012 Assembly elections there.

He contributes regularly to magazines and newspapers on political issues and current affairs and is the author of Sonia Gandhi - Triumph of Will (Tara-IRP 2005). He is currently writing Akbar (Penguin 2010), a biography of the third Mughal emperor.

Yusuf's ancestor, and namesake, Qazi Mohammad Yusuf Ansari Ghazi founded the family seat Yusufpur-Mohammadabad in the 1430's. Coincidentally, the Emperor Akbar's first firman as monarch (in 1559), was to provide a revenue free grant to a branch of the family in Awadh. However it was not until the reign of the Emperor Aurangzeb that the family rose to any real prominence at the Mughal court. The depth of his personal cultural experiences, his family background and understanding and experiences of India's political dynamics, make Yusuf Ansari an ideal writer for The Nehruvians.







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FINDING THE DEMON'S FIDDLE by Patrick Jered

Finding the Demon's Fiddle is completely based on fact and fits most closely into the genre of narrative non-fiction/travel literature. But more than anything, it is a story...or rather several stories wound around a central narrative, which move together in the same direction and all of which eventually draw to their respective conclusions. It is an account of a period recently spent in India and Sri Lanka researching the oldest extant ancestor of the violin family, the ravanhattha. A personal and travel narrative is used as a vehicle to delve into the history, religion, scripture, and mythology surrounding this fascinating instrument. The Ravanhattha, according to Hindu scripture, was invented by Ravana- a demon on a par with the Christian devil. It has been preserved from extinction by a nomadic sect of priests (Bhopas) in Rajasthan who use it during their 36-hour recitation of The Epic of Pabuji.

Besides the instrument, the book narrative also traces the Ravana mythology in India and Sri Lanka. There is a perhaps slightly controversial reassessment of Ravana which is at odds with the orthodox Hindu image of the evil demon portrayed in the Ramayana. The book is written in a deliberately easy-going, open style and can be read and enjoyed on a fairly superficial level as the story of a somewhat obsessive European meeting interesting people and experiencing unusual and often humorous situations. However, we won't pretend that the book is simple. Often the tip of the iceberg is visible, but there is a great deal happening under the surface.

The target readership is essentially in South Asia, Europe and the USA. His work has already picked up a fair amount of interest in India and Sri Lanka, and we feel that it has considerable potential in all countries, though certain aspects of it may well prove a little controversial here.



CHINA'S NIGHTMARE, AMERICA'S DREAM by William H. Avery

India as the Next Global Power



China's Nightmare, America's Dream: India as the Next Global

Power is about what India needs to do to claim world power status. It tells the story of where India has come from (great wealth over much of the last two millennia), how far it has declined (hitting rock bottom in 1991), where it is today (still an emerging power, but full of natural advantages), and what it must do to claim its rightful place in the world (convert those advantages into raw power).

Like the US a century ago and China thirty years ago, India too is on the verge of attaining great power status. But India has a problem. The world will not grant India that status simply because of its size and economic potential; India has to reach out and grab it. The problem: so far India has not demonstrated the will to do so.

China's Nightmare, America's Dream is a frank critique of India's national passivity in the conduct of its affairs, and a call to action for a more assertive India in every sphere: to fostering innovation at home, instead of building intellectual property for other nations; aggressively promoting Indian culture overseas, instead of merely importing America's; bringing the world's talent to India, instead of sending India's talent to the world; exponentially increasing military strength, instead of waiting for China to dominate Asia.

China's Nightmare, America's Dream weaves together analyses of history, economics, foreign policy and social policy to chart the past, present and future of India's rise to global power status. The book concludes by arguing that US and Indian policy makers should aim to make the bilateral relationship a 21st Century version of the US-British "special relationship."

The author is an India expert, historian, journalist and former US diplomat who is uniquely qualified to tell this story. He served in the South Asia Bureau of the US Department of State for several years in the late 1990s and early 2000s, including a posting to India at the time of the 1998 nuclear test.

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

Agra, Aligarh and Sardhana





This collection deals with the French who lived in India between 1550 and 1857, sharing their know-how and skills with the Indian states they served. The first volume concerns Delhi and Agra, capitals of the Mughal empire and some principalities like Gohad, Bharatpur (Jats), Aligarh (Marathas and Sindhia) and Sardhana (Colonel and Begum Surnroo), which became independent when the Empire started disintegrating in the 18' century. These Frenchmen loved Hindustan, where they lived and worked, often marrying Indian women and leaving descendants in their adopted country. They were instrumental in the transfer of military technology to the Indian states and they helped start a ' military revolution ' similar to the one in Europe in the

These Frenchmen were also great collectors of paintings and manuscripts. In The French & Delhi volume, there are 213 illustrations, including large drawings of the Afghan Salim Shah Suri's Blue Palace and the Mughal palaces of the capital, which were commissioned by Colonel Gentil from an Indian architect in 1774.









A Human History of Financial Speculation



What's so bad about a recession? The germs of *Money Mania* began with that chance comment in late 2007.

The fallout from the collapse of two Bear Stearns hedge funds earlier in August had gathered pace and we all clustered around Bloomberg screens daily, waiting to see if someone had called time on happy hour. On the 1st of December 2007, the US officially went into recession. It was not a surprise in hindsight, given the events of the previous few months, though few of us at the time had any inkling of how much more painful life was about to become. As defaults soared and the euphoria of the last few years evaporated, the finger pointing began. It was the fault of bankers for lending irresponsibly. It was the fault of central bankers for keeping interest rates so low. It was the fault of the politicians for turning a blind eye to the weapons of financial mass destruction massing outside suburbia and Capitol Hill.

Everybody else was to blame and everyone wanted just to return to happier days when bust was a phrase confined to late-night television and poker games, growth and ever-rising financial markets were a given and money was something we could all make or access. In short, they wanted to get back to normal.

Are crises an inevitable consequence of economic growth? Are they always bad? Do we need a lender of last resort? Are paper money systems an expensive and ultimately doomed experiment? When does a crisis of finance become one of society? These and many other implications are explored in the book's chapters.

In the end, we conclude that rises and falls are as natural to the economic condition as breathing is to the human condition. It's when we try and stifle these ebbs and flows that the system revolts. Therein lies the lesson: a clear perception of the characteristics common to these episodes can only help in warning off and curbing our irrational enthusiasm so that we remove the risks of our speculations becoming systemic. Try too hard to argue your innate brilliance and the outcome is inevitably the same, as amply demonstrated throughout recorded history.

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
